October 18, 2010 – Gustav Mahler – The Man and the Music

Rick Phillips, Former Host and Producer of CBC Radio's Sound Advice

Mr. Phillips leads music appreciation courses at the Royal Conservatory of Music and at the University of Toronto. He was associated with CBC Radio for 30 years. The music of Mahler has grown in popularity and impact. Through his music, he has struggled to understand the human soul and the meaning of death and life after death.

October 25, 2010 – Conjoined (Siamese) Twins and the Challenges That They Present.

Robert Filler, Former Surgeon-in Chief at the Hospital for Sick Children

Dr. Filler is a retired Paediatric Surgeon and Professor of Surgery and Paediatrics at the University of Toronto. This lecture will focus on the kinds of twin unions, the challenges facing the surgeon, the problems and issues encountered by the children and their families and the outcomes of treatment.

November 1, 2010 - Madness, White Nights and a Swamp: The Making of St. Petersburg

Julia Zarankin, Assistant Professor of Russian, University of Toronto

Dr. Zarankin has taught at Princeton, Stanford, University of Missouri and the Chang School of Continuing Education at Ryerson. She is a freelance writer of creative nonfiction. St. Petersburg appears to be a grandiose city but underneath the glorious facades lies a nightmarish place where things are not as they seem, where people see double and have a hard time distinguishing dream from reality. This lecture will examine some of the factors that contribute to the city's paradoxical, complex and terrifying nature.

November 8, 2010 – Tea Party Nation: Populism in America

Hugh Innes, Professor Media Studies, Ryerson University

Professor Innes has been associated with Ryerson University since 1971. He currently teaches in the joint degree program for postgraduate students in Communication and Culture with York University. He is particularly well known for his skills as a lecturer. This lecture will examine the Tea Party Movement. Where did it come from? How will it affect the American mid-term elections in November?

November 15, 2009 – Providence, Power and Peril: United States Foreign Policy in the 21st Century

Arne Kislenko, Associate Professor of History, Ryerson York University

Professor Kislenko also serves as Adjunct Professor in the International Relations Program at the Munk Centre for International Studies at U of T. He has received numerous awards for his teaching including Ryerson's first ever President's Award for teaching in December 2007. Is the "American Empire" really in decline or is U.S. power simply in transition? Examining the historical evolution of U.S. foreign policy and the international context in which it operates, this lecture will address America's contemporary role on the world stage and some of the many challenges the Obama administration faces for the future.
